

## £560,000 home for the Jewish aged





THE vast, £560,000 new home for the Jewish aged was magnificent in its design, and stood as a monument to what must be one of the most admirable characteristics of any people in the world—the loving care of its old people — and a characteristic most strongly defined in the Jewish people, the Mayor of Johannesburg, Mr. T. Glyn Morris, said yesterday.

He was speaking at the opening ceremony of the new Witwatersrand Jewish Aged Home and Chronic Sick Hospital (above) in Sandringham, Johannesburg.

In unveiling the monument to Europe's 6,000,000 martyred Jews, the Chief Rabbi, Professor Dr. L. I. Rabinowitz, said that this massacre by the Nazis was an extreme example of man's inhumanity to man.

The new home has accommodation for 560 residents. The 300 residents at the old-aged home in Doornfontein are to be moved in shortly.
