USED IN 3,000 B.C.

The lost wax process of casting models was in use in 3,000 B.C. It was used for casting bronze pillars of Solomon's temple.

It is still in use today. An example of its latter-day use is seen in Herman Wald's famous monument in the Jewish Cemetery, a memorial to those millions of Jews done to death by Hitler. This monument is partly cast by the lost wax process and partly by the new C.O.2 method.

WALD SPEAKS

Mr. Wald himself gave an illuminating short talk on the thoughts which inspired his work.

Professor Gimky, retired Professor of Engineering at Wits. University, proposed a vote of thanks to the speakers.
