Wald sculptures to be shown

HERMAN WALD died last year, leaving a rich legacy of sculptural work behind him. Now a memorial exhibition of 70 of his works will be held at the Cranbrooke Hotel from Sunday until October 21.

The exhibition is a retrospective selection of representative works, many on loan from private collections, others from among the works he left in his studio. It is presented as a memorial tribute to an artist who worked for more than 30 years in South Africa.

He was the creator of the Oppenheimer Fountain in Johannesburg and of the Monument to our Martyrs, mourning the massacre of the 6-million Jews in Europe. This monument stands in the West Park Cemetery, and Herman Wald lies buried in its shadow.

The Kria which stands outside the Sandringham Old Age Home is a monumental 3m figure which mourns for the

Although Wald's work may have had monumental quali-ties he did not forget the basic, earthly elements of life. He made many smaller pieces which decorate private homes and gardens. He emphasised the importance of love in his work. He believed that love made the world go round, and on this theme emerged works such as the Embrace and the Lovers.

Herman Wald was a deeply serious man and much in-

volved with his work. Yet despite his intensity he did not lack a sense of humour. When asked what kind of society mankind should have he replied without hesitation

"Womankind." He had an aphorism for almost every occasion and compiled a book of more than 100 aphorisms. He had the ability to extract the kernel of an idea and express it in words of clay.

pletely abstract as he felt it was not sufficient for a work of art to be "merely symbolic without having a recognisable shape or form.

Portraiture was another field in which Wald was well known. A twice-life-size bust of Albert Schweitzer stands in the foyer of one of Johannesburg's medical centres. Other busts include those of Albert Einstein, Sir Ernest Oppenhei-ther and Dr Chaim Weitzman. Herman Wald worked in
